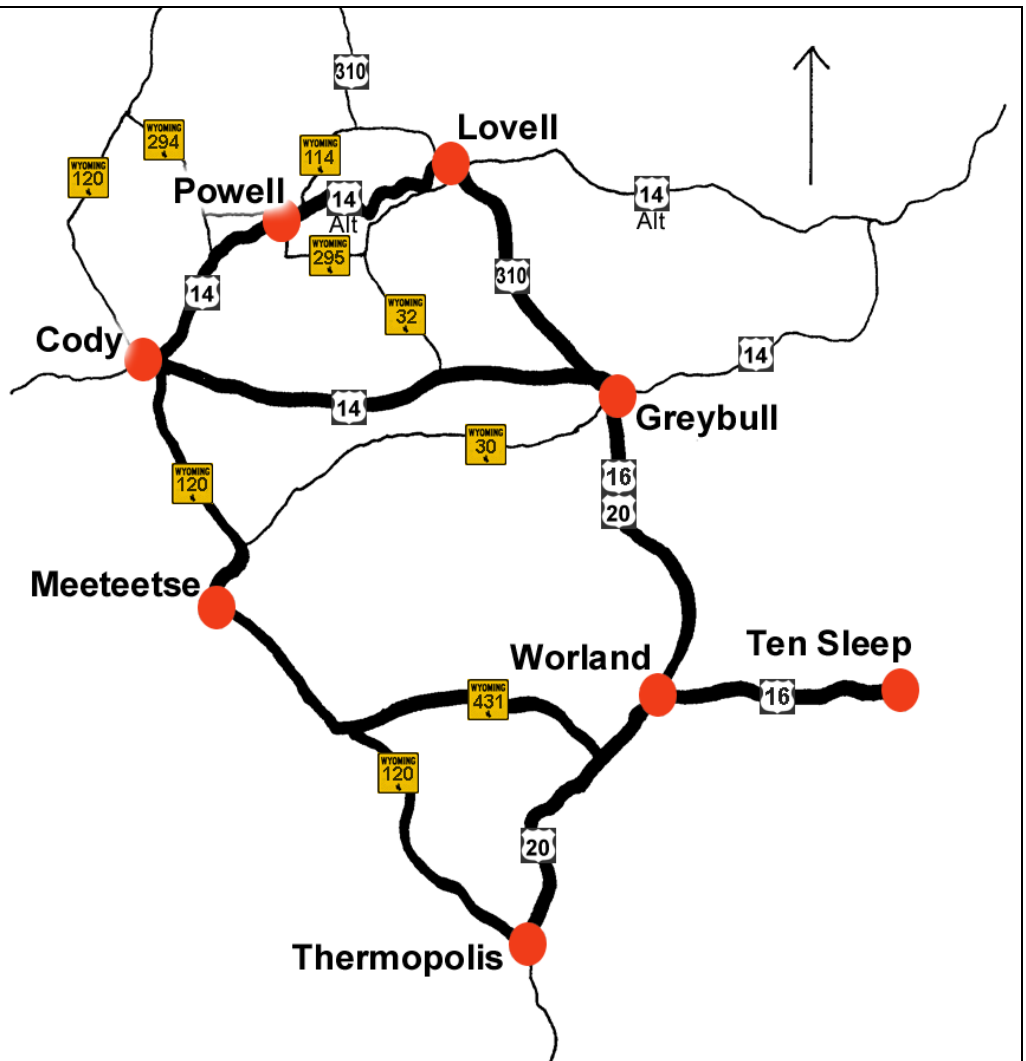

POWELL: Homesteader Museum

Tue – Fri 11-5 Sat 11-3

Homesteader Museum includes a great variety of early day artifacts, military memorabilia, dynamic geological displays and an authentic caboose similar to the one used on the branchline railroad from Frannie to Cody, Wyoming. Highlights: Photographs, maps, homesteader kitchen, Burlington Line Caboose, Heart Mountain Relocation Camp memorabilia, turn of the century woodworking tools, photographs of the Shoshone Reclamation Project, Indian equipment, Veterans memorabilia, Vintage clothing/medical displays, an old school room, and Children's Discovery Center.

LOVELL: Big Horn Canyon Visitors Center

The Bighorn Canyon Visitors Center features an orientation film and a variety of interpretive displays about the surrounding area.

GREYBULL: Greybull Museum

Displays in the Greybull Museum include Indian apparel & artifacts, historical items, guns and old weapons, a historical heritage from early pioneers, agate collection & tree sections whose age dates back millions of years.

WORLAND: Washakie Museum

The Washakie Museum offers an opportunity to relate to the living environment of the early settlers from thousands of years ago to one hundred years ago, as well as changing contemporary and other art exhibits and cultural events such as music & drama. Highlights: Rock Art, Mammoth site, Bison site, Geology/Paleontology Dinosaurs, Historic Photos, & Jim Davis portraits.

THERMOPOLIS: Hot Springs Historical Museum

The Hot Spring Historical Museum offers displays of pioneer memorabilia in the Rockies, everything from cowboy and oilfield equipment to the original Hole-in-the-Wall Bar. Highlights: Old West & Indian memorabilia, original Hole-in-the-Wall Bar, Frontier Town, scale model of old-time Thermopolis, Yellowstone Park sightseeing wagon, Burlington Northern Caboose, ag building, an old school house, and Depression shack.

MEETEETSE: (307) 868-2423

The Belden Museum of Western Photography

Mon – Sat 10-4

Collections include artifacts from the Pitchfork Ranch & photographs taken by the famous western photographer Charles J. Belden, many of which are of the Pitchfork Ranch near Meeteetse.

The Hall Museum

Mon – Sat 10-4 Sun 1-4

The Hall Museum includes collections of artifacts from early Meeteetse & the ghost town of Kirwin, the museum itself is an old Masonic Hall built in 1900.

The Bank Museum

Mon – Fri 9-5

The Bank Museum includes collections of banking artifacts from early Meeteetse, photo collections, Charles Belden photographs & archives. The building also serves as a tourist information center.

TEN SLEEP: Ten Sleep Pioneer Museum

The Ten Sleep Pioneer Museum has exhibits memorating the Spring Creek Raid, exhibit housing, and an old sheep wagon similar to the one burned in the raid.
